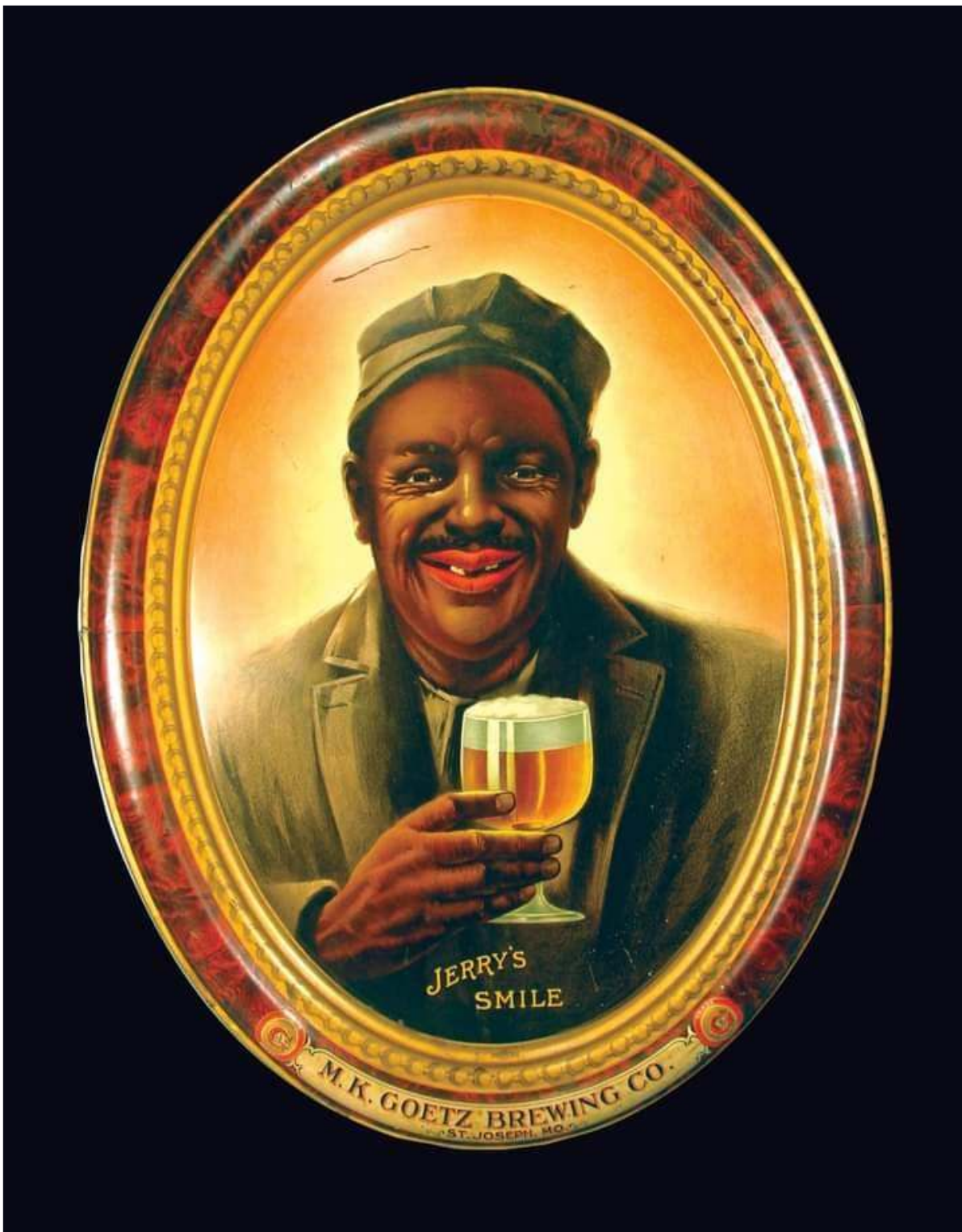

Who was “Jerry”?
Many seasoned
breweriana
collectors will
recognize the
intriguing and
memorable sign for
M.K. Goetz
Brewing Company
of St. Joseph, MO.
This striking oval-
shaped, self-framed
tin lithograph sign,
featuring a wide-
smiled black man
who is missing
some teeth and
happily grasping a
frothy goblet of
beer. It is fittingly
titled “Jerry’s
Smile”.

This sign is
intriguing in so
many ways, especially because it features an African American man who is depicted realistically and with dignity, and not in a cartoonish way, as was often seen in that era. The sign was manufactured in 1903 by the legendary H.D. Beach Co. of Coshocton, Ohio. At that time, it was highly uncommon to feature images of black society in mainstream advertising. In fact, Jerry’s warm smile, relaxed expression and seeming joy at holding his Goetz beer gives the impression that he is a spokesman who’s endorsing the product.

Exactly who was this Jerry? Because the depiction of this smiling man on the sign is so realistic and he is specifically named Jerry, it has been long assumed that he was a real person. The story told among collectors is that Jerry was a chimney sweep in St. Joseph and worked for the Goetz family at the turn of the last century. Following a good cleaning of the family's smokestack, Michael Karl (M.K). Goetz himself would reward Jerry with a goblet full of Goetz beer for a job well done. Of course, that's where the smile comes in. Who doesn't like a nice cold beer after a long day's work?

That story certainly fits the picture, but recently, more than 100 years later, we have learned a bit more. In 2008, my good friend and fellow Goetz collector Jerry Porter, also a NABA member, bought his "Jerry's Smile" sign from a family in Kansas. On the back of his sign he noticed an old piece of tape that read, "Jerry Grider". Now we had a possible last name for the mysterious character on the front of the sign.

After a bit of research by myself and friend Bob Fitzpatrick, which involved poring through old newspaper archives (from the St. Joseph Gazette-Herald and the

St. Joseph Observer) and internet searches, we discovered that Jerry Grider had indeed been a local chimney sweep.

But there was so much more to his story. It turns out that our smiling Jerry was a larger-than-life character who made a big impact on St. Joseph, and helped many of his fellow African Americans in a variety of ways. In fact, his death was significantly covered by the local newspapers. Jeremiah "Jerry" Grider was born in 1851, a dozen years before slavery was abolished, and lived as a slave in southern Missouri, only finding out he was free several years after the Civil War had ended.

Jerry made his way to St. Joseph, where he worked long hours and six days a week as a chimney sweep and later became the official sweep of the city, a lucrative position because by law, chimneys had to be swept with some regularity to avoid fires.

By various newspaper accounts over a number of years, Jerry was described as industrious and ambitious, but he often encountered rivalries, especially among his fellow African Americans in St. Joseph. He apparently was outspoken and had a booming voice and "his

laugh could be heard a block away." He was no stranger to controversy and not afraid of a good battle when it came to protecting his interests. Jerry was quite active in politics, as the state organizer of the Colored Men's Democratic Club. Notably, he helped establish and run local orphanages and old age homes for African Americans. His obituary described him, in the headline, as "The Friend of Friendless".

When Jerry died in 1917 at the age of 68, he and his wife had 5 crippled or orphaned children in their care. He was hailed as a hero for his work with the underprivileged, especially orphaned children.

Now, collectors of Goetz can admire more than just the sign we own, with the curious and interesting picture of a modest-looking black man wearing an expressive smile. We can admire the man himself who is depicted on the sign, as he was someone who worked hard to make a difference and a better life for many people. He clearly deserved the glass of beer he was holding for much more than his chimney sweeping.

Callsign Brewery Announces New Location

Finally time to post this bittersweet news to make it official.

Saturday, October 2nd will be our last business day at our original location. We hope to be up and going at our new location, 1340 Burlington St, North Kansas City Missouri on Saturday October 16th.

This move is allowing us to expand our operation for distribution, offer more food services and the location is on a main street with 24,000 cars a day that will pass by. The original location was 3000 sq ft, we will now have 23,000 sq ft. We will also have a PODCAST studio. My new podcast "AMERICAN BREWED" I hope to air close to the new year. This move is epic.



An unmistakable booming laugh announces that gregarious brewer Bryan “Bucky” Buckingham is at 3 Halves Brewing, which shares space with Jousting Pigs Barbecue on the courthouse square in Liberty.

If you’re into local craft beer, chances are you’ve consumed something made by Buckingham over the course of his two decades in the business. Buckingham worked behind the bar at long-gone brewpubs McCoy’s Public House, Power Plant Restaurant and Brewery and River Market Brewing Co. He brewed beers at 23rd Street and Free State in Lawrence and 75th Street Brewery in Waldo. Recently, Buckingham amicably wrapped up a seven-year stint at Cinder Block in North Kansas City and, in June, joined 3 Halves. “Bucky was the best possible fit for what we do here,” says 3 Halves owner John Kennebeck. “It fell into place. Our personalities gelled. Bucky brings a wealth of experience, and I’m learning everything I can from him.”

Buckingham wanted to get back to his roots at a small brewpub. 3 Halves needed an experienced brewer after the sudden passing of 3 Halves’s founding brewer, Rodney Beagle, of a medical event. The position appealed to Buckingham, who wanted “more interaction with customers in a restaurant and brewpub setting.” He also wanted to learn—even with his career now being old enough to order a beer.

“If you meet a brewer who says they know everything about brewing, they’re full of shit,” Buckingham says. Buckingham has already brewed several batches at the three-barrel brewhouse in Liberty, including Continuation West Coast-style IPA. It’s the smallest setup Buckingham has ever used but, he says, “a good brewer can brew on a one-barrel or hundred-barrel system. You just have to dial it in.”

Buckingham adjusts his eyeglasses and raises a pint of Continuation IPA past his scraggly beard. The aroma is heavy with Sabro, Equinox and Galaxy hops. The piney taste evokes the coniferous forests of Eugene, Oregon, where Buckingham lived before moving to the Midwest. Upcoming beers include a Belgian golden strong ale and an Oktoberfest lager. Expect consistent, clean and true-to-style brews.

“The beer should taste the same every time,” he says. “That’s the number one factor to successful beer-making.”

RIVER BLUFF BREWERY COMING TO RIVER MARKET

Reclaiming history

The building

The historic Water Department building — *201 Main St.* — was originally built in 1905. The main floor had a 40-horse stable, space for 35 buggies, a harness room, wash rooms and a furnace room

The brewery

River Bluff Brewery opened their 1st location in St. Joseph in 2018 — *occupying a renovated 1860's building.* The company has since won the Great American Beer Festival's Silver award for its Sandy Dunes Saison. Other staple beers include:

Arrowhead Red — *a dark amber ale with rye*

Speedliner IPA — *a transparent, juicy IPA*

River Cream Ale — *a light, crisp ale*

The expansion

River Bluff leaders looked at ~20 spots but kept coming back to the Water building. They said the River Market fit their brand and allowed them to reclaim + preserve history.

“It always came back to, ‘Let’s go to the River Market.’ It just felt like us.” — Co-founder Chris

The progress

Though it doesn’t look finished, owners said most of the renovation is complete. Beer kettles and fermenters stand ready to brew. Electrical is almost wired. Tap lines are ready to pour — *connected to a giant cooler room in the basement.* With the hard parts done, cosmetics are the last area of focus.

The future

River Bluff is tentatively planning to open in October. The team is hopeful, but they've been set back considerably due to pandemic supply chain issues. You can follow updates on their [Facebook page](#).

Brewmaster Joel Cummings said the KC location will have a lot of unique brews. Ideas include a dark wheat, a New England hazy IPA, + experimental sours. Thanks to their small batch setup, they plan to rotate the taps weekly and collaborate with other metro breweries.

Hungry for more? The brewery also plans to open an independently-contracted kitchen a few months after opening.

CARRIE NATION STARTS NEW SHOW IN HAYS

Be sure to mark your calendar for April 2nd as the 1st annual Old West Breweriana Roundup launches in historic Hays, Kansas. This already is lining up to be an excellent show with several registrations already in place. The show is Saturday in the VFW Hall at 2106 Vine St starting at 9:30. Plus there will be a hospitality room Friday night (the 1st) at the host hotel which is the Days Inn at 3205 Vine St starting at 7 and ends at 10. The \$15 registration fee for the hospitality room also gets you lunch Saturday at the show plus pizza and beer Saturday night.

The Beer-Barrel Bombers – Keg Carrying Spitfires Brought Pale Ale to The Troops at The Front

Only a few days after the Allied invasion of Normandy on D-Day, the dust and heat of the tortured area stirred up quite a thirst in the British boys on the front lines. Young men who had survived the brutal landings and pushed several miles inland found poisoned water and only a weak cider to drink. Soldiers wishing for a fine pint of beer was a common occurrence.

The boys needed their beer. Anyone who has been around young men knows they will find a way to get their beer. And it wouldn't bother them if the delivery system is illegal or otherwise non-regulation.

Upon hearing of this dilemma through a Reuters correspondent report back in London, the Henty and Constable Brewery offered free beer to the British armed forces in France. Men called "sourcers" sprang into action.

Often involved in black market goods, these men would devise a way to get the beer to the soldiers. Volunteer pilots from the Royal Air Force soon were in the bootlegging business. Jettison fuel tanks were steam cleaned, and the brewery filled the tank with beer. A quick flight up to 15,000 feet thoroughly chilled the shipment sloshing about in the tanks.

The pilot of one of the first beer runs received instructions to follow the salvo fire from the battleship Rodney and land on a small strip just to the south of the bombarded area. He and two other pilots flew across the channel and reduced altitude to 5,000 feet. He was quoted saying,

"The welcoming from the Rodney was hardly inviting, but sure enough, there was the strip. Wheels down and in we go, three Spits with 90-gallon jet tanks fully loaded with cool beer."

Neither were there any happy Brits greeting the planes as they taxied near the end of that particular runway. A man appeared from behind a tree and rushed to the Spitfires. He pointed to a church steeple and quickly explained German snipers had been taking shots at them all day. "You better drop your tanks and get off before it's too

late." The three planes did just that and got out of there in a hurry.

The alterations made to the jettison tanks was even given an official designation: Modification XXX. However, as one might expect, a tank that formerly held aviation fuel tainted its new contents with a metallic taste.

Nonetheless, the "erks," as the infantrymen were called, drank every drop. Another pilot said he hated making the beer runs as everyone at the airfield was watching and anxiously awaiting his safe landing. And if a rough landing damaged the tank filled with beer, the pilot responsible was reviled and despised for a period of time – until he successfully delivered a shipment of beer!

Enterprising Royal Air Force personnel also modified the Spitfire's bomb racks to fit barrels of beer to the wings. The beautiful aircraft would cruise through the sky with a barrel attached to either side of the fuselage. An outfit in Sussex took the idea one step further, designing a "Beer Bomb." Wooden casks were fitted with streamlined nose cones, giving the appearance of a real bomb.

Especially after refueling stations were established in the conquered territories, the jettison tanks, made in London, were no longer needed in battle and were instead filled with Black Eagle brews from Westerham. The planes would have "Bitter" on one side, and "Mild" on the other.

The Americans got onto the bandwagon after seeing the British operation, and an Icelandic pilot with modified tanks on a P51 Mustang successfully cart beer from London to France. One remark was, "...those Brits really know how to go to war." Shortly after that, Mustangs also made the beer runs, delivering the brew to the equally thirsty boys in the US Army.

In addition to the Spitfires and Mustangs, the Hawker Typhoon was also used in these goodwill missions. The pilots must have felt they were providing a humanitarian service. Often, after completing their delivery, the fighters would continue to strafe a freight train or bomb a building or two. Obviously, the beer bombs were saved for the British soldiers.

The beer runs were unofficially approved by the brass and continued until a major shortage occurred in all of England. But by then, breweries in the path of the Allied forces were pressed into service, likely to the relief of the local survivors as well as the soldiers of World War II.
